Background





- 8. Analysis of the integration of technological innovations within the framework of construction adjudication processes.

- Please, Papers should be between 800-1500 words in .docx, or .doc format.
- Any personal identifying information should not be included in the document containing the paper. Kindly, specify only your name, institution (if any), and title of the abstract in the email.
- Manuscripts should use Kabarak Legal Citation as a referencing format

- All submissions must be original and not under consideration elsewhere.
- The selected papers will be published.
- Submissions deadline is 3rd November.

Selection Criteria:

- a. Relevance to the theme (or a sub-theme).
- b. Clarity of problematic or interest of the topic in question.
- c. Clarity of reasoning and understanding of the topic.
- d. Quality of the research and references used.
- e. The ability to interconnect to disciplines.
- f. Not published previously nor submitted for publication.
