**Purpose**

This form is intended for use by Kabarak University researchers in the identification and assessment of risk associated with proposed research involving human participants or data pertaining to human participants.

Examples of low risk research include and are not limited to research based on or involving:

1. information from existing de-identified datasets;
2. historical archives and public records;
3. data collected from internet sites;
4. questionnaires and surveys on non-controversial, non-personal issues that only include basic and de-identified demographic data; and
5. unobtrusive observational studies (i.e. with no form of intervention) of people undertaking non-sensitive or benign activities in a public space.

7. questionnaires or surveys containing questions about participants' experiences, thoughts, opinions and beliefs;
